BUS VOTE THURSDAY, MARCH 10, 2022

NOON TO 8:00 PM DISTRICT LOBBY

To continue with the bus rotation schedule that the district has in place, the Morris Central School Board of Education is looking for authorization to purchase one (1) 65-passenger school bus at an estimated maximum cost of \$121,959 and one (1) 35-passenger school bus at an estimated maximum

cost of \$73,888. Eligible voters may vote in person on the date and time listed above or apply for an absentee ballot. Applications for absentee ballots to vote may be applied for at the office of the School District Clerk. The application for absentee ballots must be received no later than seven days before the date of the special district meeting if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter, or the day before the special district meeting if the ballot is to be delivered personally to the voter. All absentee ballots must arrive no later than 5:00 p.m. on the day of the special meeting. The date of the special district meeting is March 10, 2022. 

On Saturday, February 12, 2022, the Boys' Varsity Basketball Team defeated Richfield Springs in a triple-overtime game. **Jon Child** said "It was really epic. It was awesome that others stepped up when three starters fouled out. It was overall just a great team effort." The Mustangs brought a loud and proud crowd that helped to support them through the battle. At half, the Indians took a lead of 28-25, but the Mustangs quickly answer back to take the lead. The Mustangs and Indians end up tied at the end of the 4th, as well as at the end of the first and second overtimes.

In the end junior, **Ethan Franklin** hit a fabulous 3-pointer with 10 seconds left to win the game for Morris and then **JJ Benjamin** defended a fast break causing a missed shot and **Garrett Aikins** snagged one of the most important rebounds of the game to run the clock out and secure the win. Ethan said, "It felt amazing to hit that shot. That is a spot that I have really been practicing a lot." Another one of Ethan's teammates, **Asa Dugan** said, "It was a crazy game, maybe even one of the craziest I've competed in. But overall, it was an amazing experience."

OUR EARTH IS DROWNING IN PLASTIC

In America there was around 3 million tons of plastic that was recycled in 2021, but that's only a small percentage of the amount of plastic overall. Most of the plastic still just ends up in landfills. Only about thirteen percent of plastic is recycled globally.

Because of this the Otsego County Conservation Association, Otsego County Solid Waste Department, and Casella Waste Management created a challenge that is meant to collect clean dry plastic film for recycling. This school year we have accumulated 153.5 pounds of plastic for the highschool and 144 pounds for the elementary. We have kept up with this since 2018 and are continuing to collect and contribute to the challenge. For the challenge we keep bins in the lobby of our school where anybody in the community can come and drop off plastic film. The challenge started on November 15, 2021 and will end April 15, 2022. The winners will be announced April 22, 2022. When it comes to what is being recycled there is a long list of what you can and can not drop off.

WHAT CAN BE RECYCLED

- Grocery Bags
- · Bread bags
- · Bubble wrap
- · Dry cleaning bags
- Newspaper sleeves
- Ice bags
- Plastic shipping envelopes
- Ziploc and other reclosable food storage bags
- · Cereal bags
- Case overwrap
- Salt bags
- Pallet wrap and stretch film

Above is a list of what can be recycled at Morris Central School for our competition. Hard plastic and more rigid plastics can still be recycled but not for the Otsego County plastic film challenge. Plastic film cannot be collected curbside because it is difficult for the machines to separate the plastic film from the normal plastics. It jams machines when sorting and ends up shutting them down and needs to be cleaned. Plastic has to be clean in order to be recycled so when there are little film bits that are getting dirty at the bottom of the bins they tend to not get recycled.

If your school or business does not have a recycling competition like we do, you can always bring your plastic films to a local Hannaford, Topps, and Price Chopper in your area, and they will take your plastic film.

SATS WILL GO DIGITAL IN 2024

The College Board has announced that beginning in 2024, the SAT will be given digitally in the US. Students will be able to use their own device or a school-issued device. If students do not have access to a device, the College Board will provide one on test day.

Other changes to the SAT include a shorter test (two hours instead of three), shorter reading passages with one question tied to each passage (passages will reflect a wider range of topics), calculators can be used for the entire math section, and scores will be received in days, not weeks.

The SAT will still be given at a testing center and if a student loses connectivity or power, the digital SAT has been designed to ensure that students will not lose their work or time when they reconnect.

Currently, most colleges and universities are test optional for students applying to enter college in Fall 2022-Spring 2023. Last week, SUNY extended the temporary suspension of SAT/ACT testing requirements at all of their colleges through the summer of 2024. SUNY colleges and universities will continue to make their admissions decisions based on a holistic review of a student's application based on grades, program of study, exam scores, academic achievements, and other activities.



Response to Intervention

What is in Place to Help My Elementary Child with Academics?

Multiple measures of data, including teacher recommendation, are used to determine whether your child needs an intervention. If your child is struggling, they are provided with strategies in the classroom. Data is collected for five weeks to determine if the strategies are working. If results show your child needs more intensive support, a stakeholder team, called the Instructional Support Team (IST), meets to discuss your child's strengths and challenges as well as needs and possible supports for your child.

The IST may determine that a referral to RTI Tier 2/3 Intervention is necessary. In Intervention, your child is provided with more intensive interventions and are taught purposeful strategies in order to close the skill gap and help your child be successful in school.
