Superintendent's Written Directive

All people who enter school property, which also includes school vehicles, or attend school sponsored events are directed and required to follow the District's Re-opening Plan and written protocols. The Plan and written protocols can be found at http://morriscs.org/ UserFiles/Servers/Server 117587/File/ Morris%20Central%20School/MCS%20 Reopening%20Plan.pdf. This includes, but is not limited to, any requirements to wear face masks, wash hands, maintain social distancing, permit temperature checks, and answer screening questionnaires. Failure to follow the Plan or protocols, as well as failure to follow the directive of an appropriate school official relating to following the Plan or protocols, may result in a person being refused entrance, or an administrator directing the person to leave the school property or event. It may also result in further consequences as follows:

- For all people, the District may contact law enforcement for trespass where the person refuses to leave school property as directed, as well as for any other violations committed;
- For students, discipline pursuant to the District's Code of Conduct for insubordination, endangering, the health, safety, or welfare of others, as well as other applicable violations of the Code of Conduct;
- For parents and other visitors, ban on attending school events as well as consequences pursuant to the Visitors' Code of Conduct;
- For school personnel, formal discipline, up to and including termination



Winter is now upon us and with that we have snow and ice. Some of you may wonder who decides to close school. Well, it is not just one person who makes this decision. Mr. Sheldon and Ms. Jorgenson are up at the crack of dawn talking to each other, the village, town and state workers about the road conditions and the decision to delay or close school.

Everyone is aware that sometimes the weather is hard to predict. There are certain factors that come into play when deciding whether or not to close school, but always the final decision comes down to the safety of our children.

What if it does not start snowing until after your child arrives at school? This is also a difficult decision to make. In most cases, it is safer for children to stay at school. This gives the village, town and state time to clear the roads and make transportation safer. But there have been cases where students were sent home in the middle of the day because the forecast stated a major storm was approaching or would get worse before it got better.

The school has an emergency plan in case students need to be sent home early due to the weather.

- It has been decided to dismiss students early.
- A time is set when students will be dismissed.
- Radio stations are notified of the emergency closing.
- Faculty and staff are notified.
- An instant message via phone, text, and email is sent to all parents and guardians.

In addition to the Automated School Notification System we employed last year, the radio stations that announce our school closings are WSRK, WDOS, WCDO, WSKG, WGY, WZOZ, WKXZ, WCXN, WAAL and WHWK. Also, you may tune your television to Binghamton WBNG Channel 12, Utica WKTV Channel 2, News 10 Now on YNN, WUTR and WFXV Utica channel 33. You can also look at *TheDailyStar.com* for closing information, too.

It is hard to believe that we are nearing the end of the first quarter of the school year. The start of the year has definitely looked different, but things have been going very well. I can't express my gratitude enough to the students, faculty, staff and parents for your patience, cooperation and hard work that helped make the start of the school year safe and successful. As we come to the end of the first quarter and look ahead to the rest of the academic year, we continue to evaluate our reopening plans and look for ways to increase the amount of time that students can safely return to the building. Our number one priority continues is and will always be the safety of the students, while continuing to promote the academic, emotional, and physical growth of each and every student.

Following the reopening guidance plans from the New York State Education Department, the New York State Department of Health and guidance from our local Department of Health, we would like to combine our Blue and White Cohorts into one and have the students return four days a week. In order to do this, however, all students, faculty and staff will need to wear face coverings throughout the day except during meal breaks and during assigned breaks. We still hope to commence athletics shortly. The plan continues to provide three seasons with basketball in the beginning of winter, soccer and cross country in the early spring and baseball, softball and track/field in late spring. There will be strict guidelines in place in order to have these sports, including a possible limit on the number of spectators. We will continue to work with the other schools in our league and Section IV to ensure that we follow the New York State Public High School Athletic Association guidelines.

Again, I want to thank everyone for your continued support and cooperation. I know that this has not been an easy start to the school year, but together we will get through this and the students of Morris will continue to excel.


