What inspired *Levi* to do this project was his grandfather and other family members who served in Vietnam and WW II. Levi knows that our veterans are very important people and he feels that they are not appreciated, nor recognized as much as they should be. He felt it was important to honor these brave men and women.

Although his official project will not be finalized before Christmas, as he hoped, the project will continue to grow as he chose a local printer (Prolifiq) who can print banners any time they are needed. WRITING LIKE POE

In English 11, during October, students studied short stories by Edgar Allen Poe and a poem entitled "The Raven." In addition to learning Poe literary terms such as grotesque and arabesque (the physical and mental suffering of something), they also discussed allusion, symbols, and theme in depth. They discovered that Poe typically wrote about similar themes in all of his works: insanity, death, and revenge. However, they also found in "The Raven" the theme of lost love. They even discovered one story with an atypical "happy" ending for a character in "The Pit and the Pendulum."

Students enjoyed studying Poe in depth and enjoyed writing their unit-ending short story that they wrote. Their final assignment in the unit was to pretend they found an old trunk in an attic with stories they could prove were lost Poe stories.

To get inspiration for their stories, the classes went to Hillington Cemetery. There they learned about uniquely Morris cemetery history and were able to respectfully explore the grounds. They discovered unusual headstones, unique names, and stones dating back to the early 1800s.

Robert Hill said, "I liked the trip to the cemetery to get ideas for the Poe story that we made." Ryan Murphy said, "My favorite part of it was finding similar patterns throughout all of his books and then going to the cemetery to analyze graves and connect that to Poe's writing."

All in all, it was a spooktacular adventure.

THE ART OF WRITING



In November, Mrs. Waffle's Senior English class studied short stories. To end the unit, they researched how to write microfiction and had the chance to use their creativity to write a microfiction story of their own. After their stories were written, students shared their stories with a group of other classmates to workshop them. While sharing their stories, classmates were able to critique the microfiction giving the author's positive feedback about what worked in their stories and constructive criticism about how they might make it better. Sera Lentz ('25) said, "I liked sharing my story with classmates and seeing how I can make it better and more interesting." Many other students liked the idea of getting their work critiqued by other classmates because it gave a different perspective on their writing.

In December, the seniors also actively read the book *The Things They Carried* by Tim O'Brien. The book was a collection of stories about different experiences for soldiers during the Vietnam War. After reading each chapter they had to bring a picture that represented what happened in the chapter or that represented the themes they read about in that chapter. They then glued their images and words on a big poster of a soldier's helmet. By the end of the unit the whole paper was full of images and important thematic words. *Delaney Coveny* ('25) said, "I enjoyed the idea of bringing pictures in because it showed how other people viewed the story and it gave us some things to talk about." The seniors liked the book because it allowed them to see how the Vietnam War affected the soldiers and it showed them the stories they had.
